Storm Arwen

2021 wil be remembered in years to come as the year we experienced Storm Arwen. Due to the potential dangers posed by heavy winds, the Met Office named Storm Arwen as the first high impact storm of the season, which runs from September to August.

Storm names are decided alphabetically by weather officials, but the public does have some input with

more than 10,000 names submitted for consideration each year.

The name Arwen is believed to be of ancient Welsh origin and means "fair" or "good" (can't see much

similarity with the storm). It is most commonly a female name. Arwen was made famous by J.R.R Tolkein's Lord of the Rings, which sees the name translated to "noble maiden" in Sindarin (still not seeing the connection with the storm!). She is one of the half-elven who lived during the Third Age; her father was Elrond, lord of the Elvish sanctuary of Rivendell.

Almost everyone reading this will have their own story to tell about their experience on that November night, and the following days coping with the aftermath. Our fallible reliance on electricity became a reality on those days we were cut off. But, the village community prevailed and many acts of neighbourly goodwill were witnessed - see Tillside PC article on emergency planning.

The clean-up operation is still on-going with fallen trees, although no longer blocking roads, still being cleared. Buildings are still awaiting repairs, now watertight but still in need of permanent restoration.

Life goes on and there is much to look forward to in 2022 living in around Chatton.

He travelled widely as a young man and enjoyed a good life whilst running his own printing business, before selling up and moving to Chatton. Stable Cottage was his ideal retirement — a quaint old cottage next to a pub where he could enjoy himself.

I first met Stuart many years ago when he still lived in Whickham — he used to bring his beloved Dandie Dinmont Terrier to the surgery — he cut quite a dash in his open-top Mercedes and charming manners. He was always well dressed and enjoyed the chatter with vets and nurses at the surgery. Although Stuart loved the company of women, he never married.

Stuart's main love, apart from his 'Dandies' and 'Mercs', was cricket. I used to laugh at his lights being on late into the night as he followed cricket across the world – usually with a bottle of Shiraz.

Most people will remember Stuart as the slightly eccentric old boy who sat at the corner of the bar – regularly sparring with his drinking companions on the day. He had a sharp wit and equally sharp sense of humour – sometimes difficult to follow but always finishing with the most wicked chuckle.

However, beneath all the bluster was a heart of gold. Marmite would be a good description – you either got him or you didn't – a totally unique character and we will miss him.



At their last meeting on 13th January, councillors discussed the lack of emergency planning with County Councillor Mark Mather following **Storm Arwen**. In addition to some important planning applications, the PC also discussed the forthcoming **Queen's Jubilee** celebrations and felt there was a need to start planning now. It was also proposed and agreed that several benches could be made using timber from Storm Arwen and placed in locations around the Parish. Several councillors kindly agreed to donate suitable wood.

Copper's Corner

Happy new year everyone. In this edition I thought I would touch on the relevant subject of E-scooters, which I'm sure you have either heard about or even given to your children as presents. I want to make sure everyone is aware of the laws around these items as it isn't always



clear when spending anything upwards of £1000 on these items.

1/ These items are legal to own but not to use on public roads.

2/ You can only use them on public roads if they are being used as part of a government backed scheme (example being the bright orange ones in Newcastle)

3/ If not being used in one of the schemes above you can only use them on private land with the permission of the owner.

4/ If you get stopped using one on the road you might receive an expensive fine for no insurance, 6 points on your licence (yes, even if you don't currently have a licence) and the e-scooter might get seized and crushed.

5/ You can also be prosecuted for using your mobile phone when riding one as well.

These restrictions apply to all modes of transport classed as 'powered transporters', which covers a variety of novel personal transport devices which are mechanically propelled (propelled by a motor) as well as or instead of being manually propelled. It includes e-scooters, Segways, hoverboards, go-peds, powered unicycles, and u-wheels.

Don't want to bring doom and gloom around the ownership of these things as they can be fun but it's more for prevention is better than cure as I wouldn't want anyone's child to at best have their Christmas present seized and crushed by the police or at worst be involved in a serious accident when using one as they generally have no lights or bright markings.

I hope this is of some use to you all, so thanks for reading and until next time stay safe.

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Champagne & Raspberry Possets

Here is a little treat for that romantic Valentine's meal at home (or any other time).



Ingredients

140g frozen raspberries, defrosted

2 tbsp champagne (buy a mini bottle and treat yourself to a glass while you prepare dinner!)

200ml double cream

4 tbsp golden caster sugar

2 tsp freeze-dried raspberry pieces

shortbread biscuits, to serve

Method

STEP 1. Put the raspberries and Champagne in a mini food processor or blender (or use a jug and a hand blender). Whizz until the purée is as smooth as you can get it, then use a wooden spoon or spatula to push as much of it through a sieve as you can. Discard the seeds left behind.

STEP 2. Put the cream and sugar in a saucepan and warm gently until the sugar melts. Increase the heat until just boiling, then boil vigorously for 2 1/2 mins, stirring constantly. Turn off the heat and stir in the raspberry-Champagne purée. Cool for 15 mins before dividing between 2 small pots or glasses. Chill for 30 mins, then sprinkle over the freeze-dried raspberry pieces and chill for at least 2 hrs more until set (or overnight if you're making ahead).

STEP 3. To serve, remove the possets from the fridge and add some (heart shaped) shortbread biscuits
