Happy and Glorious

On 6th February 2022, the seventieth anniversary of her accession, Her Majesty the Queen became the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee. The celebration of the Jubilee culminated in a special weekend of events across the country - including Chatton & Tillside!

Planning and preparation have been ongoing for weeks but the first visible



hint of things to come was the bedecking of the village in bunting.

The bunting was originally made in 1995 to celebrate the 50th anniversary of VJ day - celebrated as the village had connections with some Japanese POWs. Sally Douglas remembers many evenings in the course of a month spent in the British Legion Hut (now the Village Hall patio area) making the bunting

with other villagers - and a raucous time it was! Gerald Dickinson provided the red, white & blue plastic sacks, cut to a template made by Mick Douglas, and stapled to string (provided by a local farmer) with staples provided by

Eddie Dickinson. There was sufficient made to line every road in the village at the time. It has been brought out on many occassions since and is still going strong.

Thanks to Michael Strother, Henry Prytherch, Peter Morgan, Barry Lister, Peter Thompson and Peter Watson who managed the mammoth task of putting up the miles of bunting. Even the Book Box did not escape adornment with red, white & blue pompoms made by Maggie Pinsent and Diane Watson.



Thursday - Beacon Lighting



The Platinum Jubilee Beacons were the first community events of the four-day Jubilee Weekend. The Principal Beacon was lit by the Queen at Windsor Castle at 9:45pm who, by pressing a symbolic globe, set off a chain of lights from Windsor Castle to Buckingham Palace. From there, thousands of Community Beacons were lit by communities throughout the regions of the UK. Commonwealth Beacons were also lit in all capital cities of the Commonwealth - 54 in total.

The Chatton Beacon was provided by the Ord family who built a splendid bonfire

on Chatton Bank that must have been visible for miles around - certainly from most parts of the village, which was still visible well after midnight.

For some of the hardier souls who managed to climb Chatton Bank (and endure the rain) to witness the lighting of the beacon, they could also see other beacons shining out in the distance from Ros Castle, Lilburn, Ingram and Bellshill.



There is a long tradition of celebrating Royal Jubilees, Weddings and Coronations with the lighting of beacons. A beacon chain, once used as a tool for communication, has now become a symbol of unity across towns, borders,



countries and continents and is often the central point of focus for any outdoor gathering or celebration. In 1897, beacons were lit to celebrate Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee. In 1977, 2002 and 2012, beacons commemorated the Silver, Golden and Diamond Jubilees of our Queen, and in 2016 Her Majesty's 90th birthday.

Friday Night Gig

Chatton Village Hall bounced to the dynamic sounds of Dialogic and Crown of Feathers, both newly formed bands who joined us in celebrating the Jubilee with great music and fantastic dancing.



DIALOGIC opened the Jubilee Show with their own brand of 80's pop rock, inspired by U2 and Simple Minds. The band was formed in 2021 by singer songwriter Tom Sykes. Dialogic's sound uses atmospheric guitar, melodic synth and soaring vocals to create a soundscape based on songs written from the heart by Tom. Iain Petrie plays bass,

Jock Leathen drums and Paul Summers is on synth, with great backing vocals from MM Sykes. Their first professionally recorded song Safe On Your Way, was recorded at Fowberry Studios and will be released on 5th August - this is a song from the heart and definitely worth checking out on their website www.dialogicmusic.com.

crown of feathers is a Soul and Funk band based in the Borders. The original concept began in 2020 when Richard Keech and lain Petrie started writing songs and putting together the band. They started



playing together in October 2021, when they were joined by drummer Caitlin Todd, bassist Tim Skelton, saxophonist Fliss Elsom-Cook and stalwart keyboard player David McLeish. MM Sykes also complements this band with funk recorder and vocals.

The name Crown of Feathers comes from a song by Eilidh Campbell, with the message of embracing what makes you passionate and being comfortable in who you are. Wear your feathers with pride. See Crown and Feathers at Horncliff Beer and Music Festival 10th July.

Both bands played with passion and wore their feathers with pride. The audience enjoyed their sound and celebrated with lots of dancing!

Chatton Cricket Club hosted a highly successful Festival Day on Saturday 14th May, to celebrate the opening of our refurbished pavilion and the visit of some special opposition, London's Inner Temple XI.

A huge community effort meant that the pitch was turned from sheep grazing to Test Match quality (Ord's



to Lord's) in 12 days, while some incredibly helpful local contractors made sure that the pavilion was ready just in time.

Fortunately the sun shone and the ground looked idyllic. Well over 100 people attended, enjoying the cricket, sunshine and the bar (and not just the lawyers!).

Chatton batted first and made a formidable 202. Leading scorers were Michael Cairns and Max Renwick (each 31), with Simon and Richard Ord piling on 40 for the last wicket.

The teams then broke for tea and scones, courtesy of Isabel Tebay and Rebecca Moss.

Then our "new" pavilion was officially opened by our Vice-President Duncan Ord, who gave a fascinating account of the history of cricket at Chatton and the important role of the Earls of Tankerville in the evolution of our national game.

The match resumed with The Inner Temple going out to bat. After a strong opening stand, their resistance faltered, Purvis being the pick of the Chatton bowlers with 4 wickets. The visitors were dismissed for 145, leaving Chatton victors by 57 runs.

Players and spectators were then called to the bar once again and enjoyed a delicious free barbecue, thanks to the generous sponsorship of Inner Temple supremo Deborah Taylor and the culinary expertise of Ian Catchpole.

Many compliments were received from the visitors about the beauty of the surroundings, the warmth of the welcome and the community spirit that was so evident on the day.
