




Act of Remembrance

A good turnout for the Act of Remembrance on 12th November in Holy Cross Church and at the War Memorial.





Those familiar with our Act of Remembrance will have noticed a slightly different rendition of Last Post and Reveille. This year both bugle calls were recordings made at the Menin Gate on 25th September 2023. We were fortunate enough to have been on holiday at the time touring the battle fields of Belgium and France where no visit would be complete without witnessing the Last Post ceremony at Menin Gate in leper (Ypres). It just happened that this particular evening the Last Post was sounded for the 33,000th time so there was a special ceremony including a lone piper and laying of wreaths.

The Last Post ceremony has taken place every evening at the Menin Gate in West Flanders at 8:00pm since 1928. After the inauguration of the Menin Gate Memorial (that lists nearly 55,000 of the 90,000 British & Commonwealth soldiers

with no known grave) a number of prominent citizens in Ypres decided that some way should be found to express the gratitude of the Belgian nation towards those who had died for its freedom and independence. So the idea of a daily sounding of the Last Post (the traditional salute to the fallen warrior) came about. The Menin Gate Memorial on the east side of Ypres was thought to be the most appropriate location for the ceremony as this was the location of the old city gate leading to the Ypres Salient battlefields through so many British which Commonwealth troops had passed on their way to the Allied front line.



The first sounding of Last Post by buglers of the local volunteer Fire Brigade took place on Monday 2nd July 1928 and since then it has been sounded at the Menin Gate Memorial every night and in all weathers.

The only exception to this was during the four years of the German occupation of Ypres when the daily ceremony was instead continued at Brookwood Military





Cemetery, Surrey. On the very Polish evening that forces liberated Ypres the ceremony was resumed at the Menin Gate, in spite of the heavy fighting still going on in other parts of the town - bullet marks can still be seen on the memorial from that time.

Four silver bugles were donated to the Last Post Association by the Brussels and Antwerp Branches of the Royal British Legion.

The President of the Last Post Association said at the special ceremony "In order to have made the Last Post sound just once for each of the 54,585 soldiers whose names are on the Menin Gate, we will have to continue each evening until 2090. If we want to do it for each Commonwealth soldier that fell during the First World War, it will take until 2540, so we still have work to do."

The Memorial currently is undergoing a two year restoration project that includes scaffolding to cover the memorial with limited access to the memorial panels, so we were not able to view the structure itself. We will have to return another time to pay respect to the names of those also mentioned on the memorials at Chatton & Chillingham.

Neighbourhood Watch



A meeting of local residents was called in 1992 to discuss the option of forming a Neighbourhood Watch group in Chatton. This was well attended in the Percy Arms and was agreed that such a group should be

formed with Ian Fletcher to be co-ordinator. A collection was made to purchase official signs around the village. In the end Ken Topham, the landlord of The Percy, agreed to sponsor the full sum to purchase the signs, so the funds collected would be banked for future use by the group.

The group has not been active for a number of years and the group funds have remained untouched in the bank for this time. In consultation with the local community police, it was agreed that the group should be formally rested. The residual funds of £130 should be donated for community use so will be donated for the Community Public Access Defibrillator to purchase battery / pads that need to be replaced after use or during regular maintenance.

Going forward, if anyone sees any suspicious behaviour they should contact Northumbria Police by calling 101 or 999 if an emergency, i.e. if a crime is happening now or someone is in immediate danger.

The Village Hall AGM was held in September and the following Trustees were elected: Andrew Pigg (Chairman), Sebastian Moss (Secretary), Alan Hardy (Treasurer), Ally Prytherch, Shi Shi Ord, Steve Parker, Claire Wilce (NAS), Richard Tebay (PC).

Outgoing Chairman Ian Fiddes reflected on the successes and challenges over the year since recovering from the pandemic closures. The completion of the Play Area was a huge achievement and Ally Prytherch and her team rightly deserve credit for their hard work & commitment to see the project through - we hope to hold a formal opening event in the Spring. Building Improvements included extensive work on the roof, and work started on the kitchen renovation (including two new dual-fuel cookers) with a grant from National Lottery Community Fund. Work on the kitchen and upgrade of the toilet areas will continue as funding becomes available.


The Gym continues to thrive with equipment upgrades attracting new members. The completion of the Village Hall Heritage Project was celebrated in an open night event in November. The many ongoing Events have included Speaker Nights, Music Nights, Coffee Mornings, Theatre Nights, Quiz Nights, and the 'Murder Mystery' evening have all proved to be big successes. A new Nintendo Switch (bought with a Ballanger Trust grant) is situated at the rear of the Hall and has proved popular with younger residents. Bookings for private functions seem steady, with regular use by the North Northumberland Autistic Society, Yoga, Pilates and Carpet Bowls.

This all requires hard work behind the scenes by Trustees and Volunteers, along with the generosity of individual donors and those who support events throughout the year. The treasurer presented the annual accounts which show that CVH is solvent and has been able to plan for improvements whilst dealing with all the usual commitments. We continue to look for grant and other fund raising opportunities, and hope to launch a Friends of the Village Hall scheme in the new year. We work closely with the Parish Council and are grateful for their support in extending our lease on the VH building. We also work closely with Community Action Northumberland to ensure and share good practice.

We are determined to develop CVH as a flourishing Community Hub for the wider Tillside Parish area, and recognise that we need more help and skills to achieve this. There are opportunities for more volunteers, whether that be helping out with programmed events or wishing to start a new group or activity.
