£13,000,0000: Amount raised in total by Macmillan Mighty Hikes nationally in 2025 - to date!

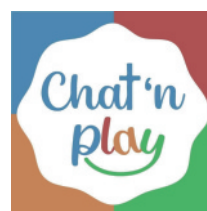
£1,163,235: Amount raised by the Giant's Causeway Mighty Hike

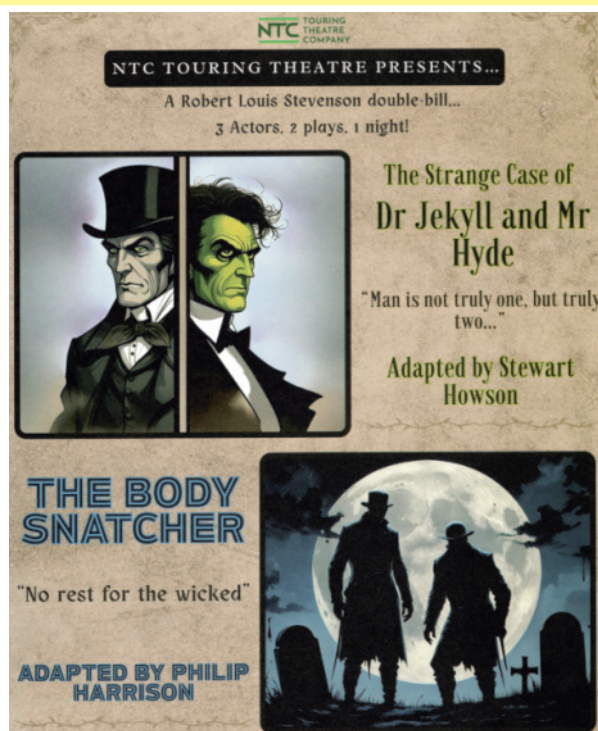

Toilets Refurbishment Project

Following the successful refurbishment of the kitchen at the Village Hall in 2023 and 2024, the Trustees are delighted to be able to announce the completion of their most recent project, namely the total demolition and replacement of the toilets. The new facilities are now operational and have received excellent feedback to date.

Fundraising for the project was achieved primarily through a combination of grants, together with contributions from locally run events – two highly successful coffee mornings and one of the quiz nights. The project cost £34,800, including an access study and some legal fees. The Trustees were delighted to be awarded a very generous grant of nearly £30,000 by Middlemoor Wind Farm, through Grantscape, and were also extremely pleased to receive a grant from our local County Councillor Mark Mather, which went towards this and our Heating and Energy Efficiency project.

The remainder of the funding came from our own resources, from the small operational surplus generated by rentals and gym memberships, and through the generous support of those who are donating through our Friends of Chatton Village Hall Scheme. (The latter is of course extremely tax advantageous to the Hall as we can claim back Gift Aid on all donations). In many cases, bodies awarding grants will only consider projects where local volunteers have already got together a starter fund, and so these early events and donations were critical to securing our third party funding.

The project was completed to time and cost, over five weeks in May and June, by three local teams. George Carr & Son carried out the demolition of the internal walls which needed moving, and also the plastering. The construction, including all civil works, such as floor screeding, new walls and ceilings, lagging and all of the plumbing (including the conversion of the old office into a temporary toilet) was completed for us by Alan Dewar (AD Home Improvements)

from Wooler. Finally, the electrics were installed by Rob Lawton and his team at Barton Ecogen.

Annual General Meeting

With the kitchen and now the toilet facilities complete, the Trustees hope that many more people will make use of these wonderful facilities.

Further updates will follow on the remaining two projects currently in progress, covering heating and energy management, and roof repairs to rectify damp issues and water leaks.

The annual general meeting for Chatton Village Hall will be held on October 7th at 7.30pm at the hall. All are welcome to attend to hear a summary of what has happened over the year, and the trustees will be there to answer any questions. If you are interested in helping out in any way at the hall as a volunteer, or by becoming a trustee, please come along and find out what we do. All welcome. We would expect the meeting to be finished by 8.30pm, after which the trustees meet as usual.
