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Stained Glass Window Returns to Old School



This beautiful stained glass window was created to celebrate the 150th anniversary of Chatton CoFE Aided First School. The designer was Helen Whittaker (MA AMGP) who worked with the children to create their designs for the window. The theme of the window is life, celebrating visible aspects of life and the spirit of community.

When the school closed in 2008, there was some uncertainty regarding the future of the building, so the window was placed in Holy Cross Church for safe keeping. Following the Village Hall Heritage project it was felt appropriate that the window should be re-installed in its original position, where it will be seen by a wider audience.



Richard Molineux, a well respected stained glass conservation expert was appointed to re-install the window. He has worked on several prestigious projects, including the Welsh Eisteddfod Crown and St Nicholas Cathedral, Newcastle.

"With over thirty years working with stained glass, it has been a pleasure to work on fitting the Chatton School stained glass window into its original location, now Chatton Village Hall.

Many thanks to the Village Hall Committee for supporting this restoration and Richard Tebay for accessing the funding that made the restoration happen.

Traffic Survey



Traffic speed transiting through the village has been a hot topic of discussion for some time. A few years ago a Community Speedwatch Group was set up, in conjunction with the

Police, to monitor traffic speed and report speeders who would receive admonishment from the Police. The group was disbanded after a couple of years as so few vehicles were being reported exceeding the speed limit, it was deemed speeding was not a problem.

The perception of vehicles speeding through the village has not gone away and during 20th - 26th June this year Northumberland County Council (NCC) commenced a traffic survey in Chatton by an Automatic Traffic Counter – you will have noticed the two pneumatic tubes pinned across the road at the western entrance of the village.

Unfortunately Tillside Parish Council were not at liberty to share the results of this survey but a direct approach to NCC and a Freedom of Information Request by **Chatton News** was successful in obtaining a summary with full data of the survey. The results make interesting

The 85th percentile is that speed at which 85% of vehicles are travelling or less, the remaining 15% of vehicles will be travelling above that speed. In order for enforcement of a 30mph speed limit to be considered the 85th percentile is required to be a minimum of 35mph. In our case, 99% of traffic travelling through Chatton was below 35mph. Based on the data obtained no further action is planned as there is no evidence of a speeding problem.

Blooming Chatton

Blooming Chatton is now in its third year and has grown steadily over this period. It is supported by band of close on 20 willing volunteers who regularly give up their time, working together to transform the village's visual impact during the spring and summer months with thoughtfully designed and sited shrubs, climbers and floral displays.

But what is blooming Chatton really about?

Having lived in Perth, Scotland for a number of years I was fortunate to have witnessed beautiful landscaping and floral displays in Perth city and in the surrounding villages which were part of the Britain in Bloom initiative. Subsequently, on moving to Chatton and, as a keen gardener, having already worked hard to bring my own garden into shape and looking beautiful, I realised that more could be done with the visual impact of the village as a whole.

I noted that, although there were a number of barrel planters sited around the village, the coordinated effort to maintain these had waned slightly. They had become largely neglected and were looking rather sad as a result.

So, the idea of Blooming Chatton was born! Deliberately named so as not to be confused with the 'in Bloom' projects elsewhere and intended as a recreational initiative rather than a competition winning stress generator, I needed just two things to make it happen - willing volunteers and cash!

The first year saw very welcome funding from the Parish Council and the owners of The Percy Arms together with donations from many local residents and, although I was initially employing help from close friends, our numbers grew quickly and many hands combined to made lighter work. Some of the more tired planters were replaced with new and all were set with fresh soil

and compost ready for the first round of floral magic. Towards the end of year one, we also initiated the removal of a significant amount of ivy from the north wall at the west end of the village and replanted with wisteria, including the installation of a wire support framework on the wall.

With advancing time our ambitions have grown and, during 2023/24, over 500 daffodil bulbs have been planted- 300 to extend Sally Barker's existing display bordering the road to the east of Bridge House and 200 more bordering the wall on the green to the west of the village.

Fundraising is ongoing. The coffee morning gang have been very supportive in sponsoring our activities and we have a collection box sited in the village store. All donations are very gratefully received and will allow future projects to become a reality. We require to purchase plants, compost and fertiliser on an ongoing basis and planters will need to be replaced as they deteriorate. Next year we hope to be able to increase the longevity of our displays by replanting in early spring.

Paying homage to our farming community, I am on the lookout for an old piece of farming machinery, a plough or similar, which might work as a focal point when integrated with a suitable floral enhancement. If you can help or know someone who can, please get in touch.

And lastly, we are by no means an exclusive group! There is much to do and all are welcome to lend a hand. Please get in touch with me via the shop if you think you might like to get your hands dirty whilst having a laugh with a few locals and catching up with the gossip!

Cuddy's Guidepost

Those readers who have lived here for some time may recall the statue of St Cuthbert that stood outside the Old School at Hazelrigg like some belated helicopter grandparent. Having suffered one road traffic accident too many, the saint has now retired to the safer environ of Glendale Business Park. To assuage the distress of pilgrims who have toiled up the (unexpectedly) steep climb from Hetton Burn only to find the statue AWOL, a new carving has recently been installed. This guidepost (or totem pole as some would have it) carries a pictorial representation of St Cuthbert's Way.

The 62 mile route starts from **Melrose Abbey**, meanders along the upper Tweed, where you might see an **Otter** (associated by Bede with St Cuthbert), passing below the **Waterloo Monument**, before climbing into the hills to cross the **Border** into Northumberland above Kirk Yetholm. The way then snakes through the foothills of the **Cheviots**, passes through Wooler to arrive at the guidepost with the ghost of **St Cuthbert**. Onwards and upwards to **St Cuthbert's Cave**, then mercifully down to the coast, carefully timing your crossing of the sands to arrive at **Lindisfarne**.

The ultra-fit do the walk in 2 days; Northern Cross, amongst others, take 7 days, but they are carrying a large cross! By a quirk of nature, it is apparently always possible to cross the sands safely on Good Friday morning.
